



		<p>Eats seafloor invertebrates, mainly crustaceans. Generally slow moving but capable of short bursts of speed.</p>	<p><i>Thornfish</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - rounded tail - sub-terminal mouth
		<p>Able to chase and capture fish and squid for food. A fast swimmer and is constantly on the move.</p>	<p><i>Kingfish</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Crescent-shaped tail - Terminal mouth
		<p>Feeds on small weed-dwelling or planktonic crustaceans. Slow moving, does not use tail for propulsion.</p>	<p><i>Sea Horse</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Prehensile-like tail used for anchorage. - Specialised mouth, 'slurps' zooplankton.
		<p>Often feeds near the surface on other fish. Generally slow moving but capable of short accurate bursts of speed.</p>	<p><i>Grouper</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Rounded tail - Up-pointing mouth
		<p>Feeds on invertebrates on the sandy seafloor. A reasonably fast swimmer, but does not swim fast all the time.</p>	<p><i>Red Moki</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Forked tail - Sub-terminal mouth
		<p>A fish that feeds on mid-water invertebrates and small fishes from below. Its deeply forked tail makes it a fast swimmer.</p>	<p><i>Horse Mackerel</i></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Forked tail - Up-pointing mouth
